Coaches Capsule

Oklahoma's Bob Stoops (Iowa '83), winner of seven national coach of the year citations last season, is in his third year at the Sooner helm. He owns a record of 24-5, which includes a 1-1 ledger against Texas. *A more in-depth look at Stoops can be found inside.*

Texas' Mack Brown (Florida State '84) is 31-11 in his fourth season at Texas. His overall mark in 18 seasons stands at 117-85-1. He is 2-1 against OU.

The Polls

Oklahoma is ranked No. 3 in both the Associated Press (media) and ESPN/USA Today (coaches) polls. The Sooners have held that ranking since the first poll of the year. Kansas State is No. 11 in the AP poll and No. 9 in the ESPN/USA Today poll.

Sooners Own Nation's Longest Winning Streak

Oklahoma owns the nation's longest current winning streak at 17, the best by the Sooners since a string of 20 between 1986 and 1987. OU has won its last 16 at Memorial Stadium. That stands as the fourth-longest streak in the land at present behind Florida State (36), Oregon (23) and Fresno State (15). OU is 14-0 on Owen Field under Bob Stoops.

The Series

Texas leads the series, 55-35-5, including a 43-31-4 mark in Dallas, the host city for the game since 1929. Oklahoma prevailed last season, 63-14, while posting its widest victory margin ever against a ranked opponent. The 63 points, 36 of which came on six TDs by Quentin Griffin, also represented the most ever scored by the Sooners against Texas. OU will be trying to defeat the Longhorns in back to back seasons for the first time since 1987 and 1988, which actually capped a string of four straight wins for the Sooners in the series.

This Series is Rank(ed)

For the 27th time, Oklahoma and Texas enter this game with both teams toting a national ranking. For the seventh time both schools are listed among the top five ...

- 1950, Oklahoma was No. 3 and Texas was No. 5 (OU won, 14-13).
- 1963, Oklahoma was No. 1 and Texas was No. 2 (UT won, 28-7).
- 1975, Oklahoma was No. 2 and Texas was No. 5 (OU won, 27-17).
- 1977, Oklahoma was No. 2 and Texas was No. 5 (UT won, 13-6).
- 1979, Oklahoma was No. 3 and Texas was No. 4 (UT won, 16-7).
- 1984, Oklahoma was No. 5 and Texas was No. 1 (tie, 15-15).

The Texas Sooners

The current OU roster shows 40 Texans, including 14 on the two-deep.

Sooners Against Ranked Opponents

This will be Oklahoma's 195th game against a ranked opponent (AP poll since 1946). The Sooners are 102-85-7 (.549) in those games. Bob Stoops is 8-1 against ranked opponents and has won seven straight dating back to a 38-28 loss to No. 23 Texas in 1999. Stoops' teams have played seven top 10 teams and won all those games, including five by double digits, with an average margin of victory of 21.4 points per game.

OU's Most Recent Game

A quick review of the Sooners' most recent outing, a 38-37 triumph over Kansas State at Norman last week ...

- Oklahoma enjoyed leads of 14-0, 21-7, 28-14 and 35-14, yet had to bat away a desperation throw on the game's last play to preserve the win.
- It was OU's first one-point game (win or lose) since a 10-9 win over TCU, 9/12/98.
- Kansas State out-gained OU, 446-225, but was nagged by 17 penalties for 139 yards.
- Oklahoma had its longest scoring drive (by plays and time) when it marked 71 yards in 16 plays and 6:10. The drive culminated in a 33-yard field goal by Tim Duncan, the OU points of the game. Earlier in the game, an 88-yard drive was the longest of the season.
- Antwone Savage, who now has 17 catches for 350 yards and three touchdowns in his career against Kansas State, became only the fourth player in school history to throw for a touchdown and catch one in the same game (see more on page 4).
- KSU's Aaron Lockett, the 2000 national leader in punt returns, had one yard on two returns.
- Of the 20 incompletions Ell Roberson threw, OU got a hand on 11 of them -- 10 pass deflections and one interception.

5 and Oh

Oklahoma is 4-0 for the second consecutive season and for the 29th time in its 107-year history. The Sooners now shoot for 5-0, something they've done in 20 previous seasons.

Terrific Tandem

Never has Oklahoma had two receivers with 100 career receptions on the same roster. Antwone Savage (86) and Curtis Fagan (82) could alter that statistic.

Baby Boomers

Twenty-three of the players listed on the Oklahoma two-deep are freshmen or sophomores.

Sooners Not Possessive

Oklahoma has 11 scoring drives of less than two minutes this season. They have had 72 of those brief, but productive possessions over the last three seasons.

Dominant Defense

- Opponents have completed 50% of their passes just nine times in 28 games against Stopped-coached OU teams. The last seven OU opponents failed to hit 50%.
- The OU defense has at least one interception in 17 of the last 18 games dating back to 1999.
- During those 18 games, OU has recorded 29 interceptions and 149 pass deflections.
- OU hasn't allowed 300 yards rushing since Nebraska did so in 1997 (42 straight games).
- OU hasn't allowed 200 or more yards rushing in 24 straight games. That includes this year's game vs. K-State, which was ranked No. 1 in the nation in rushing entering the contest.
- OU has forced at least one turnover in 27 of the last 29 games, including the last 18 in a row.
- In the 29 games under this staff, OU opponents have scored 14+ points just 10 times.

And They Score, Too

Oklahoma's defense has scored in six of the last seven regular season games. OU defenders have averaged 25.5 yards on returns of six INTs (one TD) and four fumbles(four TDs).

Spreading the Wealth

- Twelve Sooners have at least one pass reception. Over the course of the 2000 season, 13 OU players caught passes.
- Last season, a whopping 15 Sooners scored touchdowns. This season 12 Oklahoma players have been in the end zone.
- Ten different players have accounted for OU's 14 takeaways this season.

Sooners Help Relief Effort

Members of OU's football and men's basketball teams worked with Norman firefighters Sept. 28 at a car wash to raise \$20,000 for firefighters in New York City. During the Kansas State game, fans donated more than \$68,000 for the United Way. An anonymous contributor gave the necessary amount to raise the total to \$70,000.

Sooner Summation

- Under Bob Stoops, Oklahoma has had a double digit lead in all but four of its 28 games (exceptions are Colorado, Texas Tech and Mississippi in 1999, and Texas A&M in 2000).
- OU is 22-19 in Big 12 games and has won its last 10. Bob Stoops is 14-3 vs. the Big 12.
- OU has at least one TD from a unit other than the offense in 12 of Bob Stoops' 29 games.
- LB Rocky Calmus, P Jeff Ferguson, LS Ben Panter, WR Josh Norman and OT Frank Romero are the team leaders in games played at 40. Panter's 40 straight starts lead the squad. Of the regular position players, the longest consecutive starting strings belong to Romero, SS Roy Williams and defensive end Cory Heinecke at 21.
- The '02 schedule -- Aug. 31 at Tulsa, Sept. 7 ALABAMA, Sept. 14 TEXAS EL-PASO, Sept. 21 open, Sept. 28 SOUTH FLORIDA, Oct. 5 at Missouri*, Oct. 12 Texas* (at Dallas), Oct. 19 IOWA STATE*, Oct. 26 open, Nov. 2 COLORADO*, Nov. 9 at Texas A&M*, Nov. 16 at Baylor*, Nov. 23 TEXAS TECH*, Nov. 30 at Oklahoma State*
- As part of the OU's \$100 million *Great Expectations: The Campaign for Sooner Sports*, Memorial Stadium will be going through an upgrade, which is expected to begin after this season. The \$65 million stadium project will renovate all facility structures and amenities, replace current seating, and add new seating - including 2,200 club seats and 27 sky suites to bring capacity to more than 80,000. Renovations are expected to start just after the 2001 football season and be complete in time for the 2003 season.

Rocky Calmus was busy against Kansas State. The senior had 10 tackles (eight solo), with two pass deflections, two quarterback hurries and a blocked extra point. Here's more on the linebacker being mentioned by some as a Heisman Trophy candidate ...

- Only the 15th Sooner to reach 300 career tackles and he has 15 double-digit tackle games for his career, including three this season.
- His 47 career tackles for loss rate as a school record, breaking the mark of 44 set by Brian Bosworth.
- Calmus has 29 "touches" during his career -- 20 deflections, six fumble recoveries and three interceptions. Of the four takeaways he has returned (had no return on one of the interceptions), he has averaged 28.7 yards with three touchdowns.

C Vince Carter, a true freshman, made his first career start against Kansas State. The Sooners were in the shotgun formation most of the game, but Carter had no bad snaps

WR Mark Clayton made first career start vs. K-State. Only wide receiver on the team with a catch in every game this season.

OT Howard Duncan has won a national championship in every year of his collegiate competition -- two that he won at Butler County Community College and one that he won at Oklahoma.

K Tim Duncan is enjoying another good season ...

- Has 250 career points and is only the 15th Sooner to reach 200.
- This season, he has drilled 7-of-11 field goals and 19-of-20 PATs (one miss came from 35 yards following OU penalties).
- He has made 78 of his last 80 PATs and now ranks No. 4 in school history with 31 field goals.

FS Brandon Everage had a career-high 12 tackles at Air Force.

- Average tackles per game is up from 4.2 last season to 6.8 this season.
- Got his first career sack against Kansas State.

WR/PR Curtis Fagan had no collegiate punt returns prior to the North Texas game. Now, in two games in that role, Fagan has 16 returns for an average of 9.5 yards.

- He needs five touchdown receptions to reach 14 for his career and a Sooner record.

P Jeff Ferguson is a do-it-all punter ...

- Averaging 46.2 yards with nine kicks downed inside the 20.
- Could become only the second Sooner to average at least 40 yards in each of his four years (Michael Keeling accomplished the feat 1979-82).
- With a 43.0-yard career average, the senior is attempting to break a 60-year-old Oklahoma mark, Jack Jacobs' career punting standard of 42.3 yards, which was set from 1939-41.
- Of his 187 career punts, 58 (nearly one-third) have pinned the opponent inside the 20. His 71-yarder at Air Force was the second-longest of his career. He has 37 of 50 yards or longer in his career.
- Opponents are averaging 13.2 yards per return, but that number is misleading. Minus an 89 yarder by North Carolina's Michael Waddell, the foes average just 5.6 yards per return.

RB Quentin Griffin is proving himself a threat on several fronts ...

- Holds the school record for receptions in consecutive games with 22. The streak is ongoing and covers every game of his career.
- Tied the school record with 10 receptions against North Texas. It was the highest total ever by an OU running back.
- Holds Oklahoma career bests for receptions (74) and receiving yards by a back (533).
- Rushed for a career-high 201 yards on 26 carries at Air Force, the best total by a Sooner since De'Mond Parker's 207 against Baylor (11-14-98).
- In the very next game, he had the 10 catches for 111 yards against North Texas.
- Reached 2,000 career all purpose yards in just his 21st game.
- Has six multiple touchdown games.

DL Tommie Harris became the first true freshman interior defensive lineman to start for Oklahoma since 1987. That year, Marcus Lowe got a start against North Texas.

DE Cory Heinecke had a 69-yard fumble return at Air Force.

QB Nate Hybl has hit 57.2% of his passes, which would rank No. 6 for a season at OU.

- Has three touchdown throws of 57 yards or longer over the last two games.
- Hit at least one pass of 55 yards or longer in each of the last three games.
- His six touchdown passes have gone to five different receivers.

LB Teddy Lehman equalled his career best for single game tackles with 11 against North Texas. Lehman tips the scales at 225 pounds, but as a high school track and field athlete he was a heavily decorated sprinter, finishing second at the 2A state meet in 100 meters.

WR Damian Mackey was OU's punt return specialist in the first two games when he averaged 8.5 yards on 10 returns.

DB Matt McCoy got his first career interception against Kansas State.

LB Brandon Moore had a career-high seven tackles at Air Force, then set a career-best for TFL with five against North Texas.

WR Josh Norman had a career-long 57-yard reception (TD) vs. North Texas.

OT Frank Romero has not allowed a sack this season after permitting just two last season.

WR Antwone Savage became just the fourth Oklahoma player to catch and throw a touchdown pass in the same game when he turned the trick against Kansas State. He tossed a 33-yard score to QB Hamilton Wall on a faked punt, and made a pair of grabs for 138 yards. Both of his receptions went for touchdowns, one from 63 yards and another from 75, the latter of which accounted for a career long.

- Over his career, one out of every five of his receptions has resulted in a TD.

TE Trent Smith has made nine of his 11 receptions over the last two games (5 vs. NT, 4 vs. KSU).

CB Derrick Strait returned an interception 47 yards for a touchdown against North Carolina.

DE Jimmy Wilkerson equalled his career high with 8 tackles against Kansas State, including four for loss. He forced the fumble that Roy Williams returned 18 yards for a touchdown.

- He has at least one tackle for loss in every game this season.
- Leads team with five QB hurries and eight tackles for loss.

S Roy Williams returned a fumble 18 yards for a touchdown in the win against Kansas State. In the game prior to that, the junior safety had a hand in all three North Texas turnovers. He had a career-high two interceptions and forced a fumble that was recovered by OU. As if that wasn't enough, Williams had a career-best 15 tackles.

- Needs just two stops to reach 200 tackles for his career.
- Went over 200 career tackles in the Kansas State game. He now has 207, the fifth-best total ever by a Sooner defensive back. He needs three to move ahead of Darrius Johnson and eight to pass Jason Belser.

Andre Woolfolk is a starter WR and CB in the first two games, a role he also filled last season. He is the first Sooner to play on both sides of the ball since Bud Hebert (A-bare) worked at both S and SE in 1979.

- His three receptions have gone for 81 yards and a team-best 27.0 yards per reception.

RB Renaldo Works recorded his second career 70-yard run when he broke away for a 72-yard TD against North Texas. He had a 75-yarder against Arkansas State last season.

Oklahoma head coach Bob Stoops has coached in 13 bowl games, including two as a head coach.

For many, those accomplishments would read rather nicely for a career. For Stoops, it represents a good start.

At the tender coaching age of 40, OU's head coach led his team to the 2000 national championship and emerged as the consensus national coach of the year.

Stoops shrugs at the overwhelming nature of his early success while keeping his eye and his team focused on the future. Still, what is done is done, and the early returns are more than impressive ...

• He is just the second coach to lead his first two OU teams to bowls (Chuck Fairbanks was the other).

• At 23-5, he is only the second coach to have 19 or more wins after his first 25 games at OU (the other is Barry Switzer at 23).

• In 11 home games, his

Oklahoma teams have out-scored their opponents 545-138.

• His teams are 6-0 against top 10 teams and have outscored those opponents 226-91, an average scoring margin of +24.8.

If not for the meteoric pace, Stoops' resume would read like a textbook rise to a head coaching position.

A four-year starter as a player at Iowa, he began his coaching career in a volunteer capacity at his alma mater in 1983. He worked his way through the ranks (see the chart at left) until he became defensive coordinator at Kansas State from 1991-95. There he played a key role in one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football history. During his final four seasons there, K-State posted a 35-12 record and played in three bowl games.

From Manhattan came a three-year stint as Florida's defensive coordinator from 1996-98. It was during that time that the national spotlight focused sharply on his accomplishments and the door opened for a head coaching post.

At Oklahoma he has restored the tradition of Sooner football, while also carving out a niche' for this era and these teams.

OU employs a balanced and unpredictable offense (Sooner receivers rushed for 261 yards last season) and the kind of impenetrable defense (No. 5 in total defense and

scoring defense in 2000) one might expect from a coach who spent much of his career on that side of the ball.

Not surprisingly, Sooner fans love their head coach and are tangible in their affection -- every home game of Stoops' tenure has been a sellout.

To paraphrase Stoops' post-Orange

Bowl comment, Oklahoma is indeed "back" and it's a return that not so coincidentally mirrors the tenure of the Sooner coach.
