The Game

Oklahoma makes its 39th bowl appearance, but its first in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl when the Sooners meet Oregon. This marks the seventh bowl game in seven seasons for Oklahoma under Bob Stoops. Before the current coach arrived in Norman, OU had gone four seasons without a bowl appearance.

■ This is Oklahoma's second trip to California and second game against a Pacific 10 Conference team in 2005. The Sooners played UCLA at the Rose Bowl on Sept. 17, and dropped a 41-24 decision.

■ Oklahoma and Oregon played last season and are scheduled to play again in 2006. The Sooners prevailed last season in Norman (Sept. 18) by a 31-7 count. The two will meet again next year on Sept. 16 in Eugene.

Interview Procedures

Oklahoma's locker room is closed at all times. Requested coaches and players will appear in designated interview areas. Requests for interview subjects should be directed to the OU Athletics Media Relations staff.

■ For this game, OU is represented in the press box by Kenny Mossman, associate athletics director; Jessica Summers, assistant media relations director and Jared Thompson, media relations graduate assistant.

■ During the week of practice leading up to the game, interviews are restricted to the practice site and then only at designated times.

Staff Changes

Since the Oklahoma bowl guide went to press, there has been a change on the Sooner coaching staff. Offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Chuck Long was named the head coach at San Diego State on Dec. 17.

■ Also on Dec. 17, OU head coach Bob Stoops announced that Kevin Wilson would assume offensive coordinator and play-calling duties. Wilson joined the OU staff at the end of the 2001 season (just prior to the 2002 Cotton Bowl game vs. Arkansas) as the co-offensive coordinator, running game coordinator and offensive line coach. He previously had offensive coordinator duties at Northwestern and Miami of Ohio.

■ As of this writing, Stoops had yet to fill the vacancy left by Long's departure.

■ Long is the fourth Oklahoma assistant to leave for a head coaching position since Bob Stoops came to OU. The other three are Mike Leach (Texas Tech), Mark Mangino (Kansas) and Mike Stoops (Arizona).

Bowl Travel

Oklahoma arrives in San Diego on Dec. 23 and will practice that day. The return is set for Dec. 30, the day after the game. The team headquarters in San Diego is the Sheraton San Diego Hotel and Marina.

SEASON NOTES

The Oklahoma-Oregon Series

- OU leads the series, 5-0. All five previous games took place in Norman, Okla.
- These two teams are scheduled to play Sept. 16, 2006, in Eugene, Ore.
- These two teams played on Sept. 18, 2004, with Oklahoma posting a 31-7 victory in Norman. Adrian Peterson carried 24 times for 183 yards and two touchdowns. OU rushed for 214 yards and passed for 213.

Oklahoma's Most Recent Game

- Oklahoma throttled Oklahoma State, 42-14, in the regular season finale at Norman on Nov. 26.
- In the 100th renewal of the Bedlam series, OU picked up its 77th win against its in-state foe.
 - Adrian Peterson earned Walter Camp National Player of the Week honors when he carried 24 times for 237 yards. He scored on touchdown runs of 84 (longest rush of his career and the longest by a Big 12 player this season) and 71 yards.
 - Rhett Bomar completed 13-of-21 passes for 298 yards and three touchdowns. Two of this throws were dropped, including one that would have likely gone for a 70-yard touchdown. Bomar also rushed twice for 29 yards.
 - Oklahoma's defense allowed the Cowboys just 13 yards on 13 rushes and only 139 total yards, 56 of which came on one play. OU rolled up 560 yards with 354 of those coming on the ground.

Sooner Trends

- Oklahoma won five of its last six games.
- Five Sooner games this season were decided by seven points or less. OU was 3-2 in those games.

Sooners Played Most Difficult Schedule

- Oklahoma's schedule ranks No. 1 nationally (see chart).
- The four teams that defeated OU are a combined 38-5 and all are ranked.
 - Last season, Oklahoma's end-of-year schedule strength ranked No. 11. That ranking was No. 23 in 2003, No. 37 in 2003, No. 60 in 2001 and No. 21 in 2000.
 - The 2006 schedule includes a home game with Washington and a road game at Oregon.

Stoops Era Attendance Eclipses Three Million

Oklahoma has sold out all 42 home games of Bob Stoops' tenure and during the 2005 Tulsa game the total attendance for that period exceeded three million. The total stands at 3,312,808. OU has exceeded its listed capacity of 82,112 in 17 straight games.

Oklahoma Picks Up Win. No. 750

The win over Tulsa was the 750th all-time for Oklahoma. The Sooners' all-time record now stands 756-288-53. OU is one of just eight schools with 750 victories. With 1,097 games played, the Sooners are just three away from 1,100. Nineteen other schools have played 1,100 games.

OU Brand Among the Nation's Most Popular

The Collegiate Licensing Co., announced its top-selling entities for the most recent fiscal year and the OU brand ranks a highest-ever No. 5. North Carolina is tops followed by Michigan, Texas, Georgia and Oklahoma. Some of the Sooner proceeds benefit Bizzell Library on the OU campus.

Injury Bug Bites

Oklahoma players have combined to miss 39 full games this season due to injury. There are another six who missed partial games (more than half of the game).

- Several positions have been impacted, but none like the center spot. Jon Cooper, the third player to hold the position this season, went down with a dislocated/fractured right ankle in the second quarter of the Texas Tech game. He was replaced by Chris Bush, who was nursing a broken hand. Bush had replaced Chris Chester, who was sidelined for four weeks with a knee injury, then broke his hand in the week leading up to the Texas Tech game. OU has backups J.D. Quinn and Kelvin Chaisson, both of whom played the center during the spring, ready to go if needed. If someone other than Bush or Chester plays the spot (Cooper is out for the year), it will represent the fourth different player to snap the ball (other than special teams) this season.

- Going four-deep is not unprecedented this season. OU started fourth-string running back Jacob Gutierrez against Baylor (his first start came against Texas as a wingback). He ran for 173 yards and two touchdowns in that game. But that didn't make him immune to injury as he suffered a dislocated elbow at Nebraska the next week.

- OU was without leading rusher Adrian Peterson for all or more than half of four games (ankle) and has been without leading receiver Travis Wilson for one full game and nearly half of another.

Sooner Youth Movement

Last February's recruiting class was lauded as one of the nation's best, and that talent has found its way to the field with 12 true freshmen seeing game action so far this season, which ranks No. 7 in the nation. Eleven true freshmen started games, which ranks No. 2 nationally.

Sooners Taking a Different Position

Paul Thompson's move from QB (he's still the No. 2) to WR and Allen Patrick's change from DB to RB continues a venture that has been successful under Bob Stoops -- players changing positions. Here is a look at some of the more successful moves over the last seven seasons:

OFFENSE NOTES

About the Sooner Offense

- Under Bob Stoops, OU has produced its career leader in passing and receiving, while also turning out the fourth ranked rusher in school history and the school record holder for single season rushing yards.
- OU has scored at least one touchdown in 91 consecutive games dating back to Nov. 7, 1998.
- Under Stoops, OU has rushed for 200 yards 27 times, including 22 over the last four seasons.
- Also under Stoops, OU has 93 TDs of 25-plus yards and 210 scoring drives that took less than two minutes.

More Milestones for Peterson

- Sophomore RB Adrian Peterson now has 2,949 yards for his career and needs just 51 to reach 3,000. He has eclipsed 1,000 yards (1,024) for a second straight season.
- Since missing all or more than half of four straight games with ankle injuries, he has now ripped off four straight 100-yard performances..
 - Despite all of the missed time, Peterson logged more rushing yards this season than any other Big 12 running back.
 - He had two, 200-yard games this season -- 220 vs. Tulsa, 237 vs. Oklahoma State.
 - With 15 touchdowns this season, Peterson has one more than he scored in 13 games last season.
 - During the off-season, he had surgery on his left shoulder, which precluded his participation in spring practice.

AD: What If?

Adrian Peterson missed all or part of four games and is averaging 102.4 yards per game. In the games in which Peterson was deemed healthy, his per game average was 140.0 yards. Over 11 games, that average would project to 1,540 yards, rather than his current 1,024.

Two Times 2,000

With Kejuan Jones (2,295) and Adrian Peterson (2,949) both over 2,000 career rushing yards, it marks the first time since 1987 that two concurrent Sooners eclipsed the figure. Lydell Carr finished with 2,910 and Jamelle Holieway with 2,713 that year. It also happened in 1986 when Carr and Spencer Tillman both eclipsed 2,000.

- Both continue ascensions up the career rushing touchdown list at OU. Jones is tied at for sixth with Steve Davis with 35. Peterson has 29. He needs one to crack the top 15.

Rushing Game Revival

- Against Kansas, Donta Hickson (18-59) and Kejuan Jones (16-51) both eclipsed 50 yards while splitting the reps. A case could be made that one back might have made it over the century mark.
- The following week against Baylor, OU got 205 yards on the ground for its third 200-yard performance.
- Jacob Gutierrez went for 173 on yards on 30 carries against Baylor. Prior to that game, the soph's career numbers (all this season) were 14 rushes for 73 yards.
- Adrian Peterson carried 24 times for 146 yards at Nebraska and the Sooners had 45 for 180.
- Against Texas A&M, Oklahoma racked up 211 yards and three touchdowns on 48 attempts. Peterson carried 27 times for 135 and two scores.
- At Texas Tech, the Sooners ran for 162 yards. Adrian Peterson led the way with 108, but QB Rhett Bomar, due

in large part to no sacks, also finished on the plus side of the ledger with 25.

- Against Oklahoma State,OU broke loose for 354 rushing yards, 237 by Adrian Peterson.

Surprising Sacks Numbers

Oklahoma has surrendered 21 sacks this season, which is definitely higher than the nine of 2004, but considering all of the injuries and youth in the line, it isn't all that bad. Currently, it rates as the fourth-best season for low sacks during the Stoops tenure. OU, which did not allow a sack in either of its final two regular season games, has allowed just three sacks over its last four.

Bomar Sooner

A look at RS-FR quarterback Rhett Bomar, who came off the bench in the opener, but has since been the starter:

- Since completing 7-of-18 passes in his first two games, he has hit 50%+ in seven of the last nine.

- He has positive rushing yards in seven of 11 games.

- He had a string of 73 throws without an interception snapped against Texas when one of his tosses bounced off a Sooner receiver into the hands of a Longhorn.

- In a two-game stretch vs. UCLA and Kansas St., he was 32-of-51 for 380 yards with one TD and no INT.

- He has 14 rushes of more than 10 yards with a long of 42 vs. K-State. He had a 32 yard-run vs. Texas A&M and

a 28-yarder vs. TCU. Only twice during the previous two seasons did a starting Sooner QB have rushes of 10 or more yards (Jason White 10 vs. Texas in 2003 and 12 USC last season). White finished in positive rushing numbers just five times over those two seasons (once in '03 and four times in '04). Bomar has had a positive rushing number in seven of his 10 starts.

- That 2001 Kansas game was the most recent time that a Sooner QB led the team in rushing (White 12-117) until Bomar's 67 yards topped OU in this year's Kansas State tilt.

- Bomar rushed for touchdowns in back-to-back games (UCLA and Kansas State), a first at OU since Nate Hybl did it against Air Force and North Texas in 2001.

- Bomar has 166 rushing yards and four TD. Paul Thompson is the top rushing QB by yards during the Stoops era with 183 in 2003. Josh Heupel is next with 144 in 2000, then Bomar. Heupel was the top TD scorer with seven in 2000 and five in 1999. Bomar is next.

The Good Hands Backs

RB Kejuan Jones and FB J.D. Runnels rank as two of the most potent backfield receivers in Oklahoma history (see chart at right). Quentin Griffin is the leader in catches, yards and touchdowns. He had seven receiving TDs. Runnels has four and is tied for second among the backs with James Allen. Jones has one.

Young But Catching On

The receiving corps is another place where Oklahoma's youthfulness manifests itself. Nine of the 16 players with a catch this season have at least two years of eligibility remaining after this season.

- The nine touchdown throws have gone to a sophomore (two), a true freshman (five) and a senior (two).

- Malcolm Kelly is the first freshman since Steve Rhodes in 1975 to lead OU in receiving. Rhodes, who played during the wishbone days, had six receptions. Kelly had eight in the Nebraska game alone.

Patchwork Trenches

Due in large part to injuries, OU has had five different starting line-ups along its offensive line. Last year's team had three different lineups through 13 games. Vince Carter ended his career last season with 26 straight starts at center. Three different players have started at that position this season. And the Sooner offensive linemen have played a number of positions during their respective careers:

- LG Davin Joseph has 28 starts at right guard, 10 at left tackle and one at left guard.

- RG Chris Bush has five starts at left guard, six at right guard and eight at center. Bush has four starts at right guard and six at center this season.

- C Chris Chester has four starts at RG, three at C. He's the only lineman on the team with a touchdown, coming on a fake FG at Missouri in 2002 when he played TE and caught a pass.

- OT Chris Messner started the 2003 Alabama game at left tackle, then got the nod at right tackle in this year's season opener and has since returned to the lineup in that same slot.

DEFENSE NOTES

About the Sooner Defense

- Oklahoma has forced at least one turnover in 80 of Bob Stoops' 90 games and has at least one interception in 59 of the last 77 games. OU has multiple picks in 20 of its last 47 outings.
- Opponents completed 50 percent or more of their passes in less than half of their games against Stoops-coached teams -- 42 times in 90 games.
- Foes scored less than 14 points in 48 of the games.
- OU has eight shutouts under its current coach. During that same period, the opponents failed to score more than seven points 26 times.
- This season Oklahoma is ranked No. 5 nationally in rushing defense (91.2) despite the fact that the Sooners have played four of the top 55 rushing teams, including No. 3 Texas.

Several Numbers Compared Favorably with 2004

- Through 13 games last season, Oklahoma logged eight interceptions. Through 11 games of this season, the Sooners have 12. Perhaps more important that the actual number has been the yards gained after a pick. Last year's team logged 120 return yards with no touchdowns. This team has 220 return yards and three touchdowns -- a 48-yarder against Tulsa by Clint Ingram, a 65-yarder by D.J. Wolfe vs. Kansas and a 63-yarder by Chijioke Onyenegecha at Nebraska.
- Oklahoma logged 39 quarterback sacks in '04. This team has 42. The '05 Sooners have an outside shot at the sacks best for the Stoops era. That number was set at 45 in 2003.
- Last season, 19 different Oklahoma players registered at least one tackle for loss. This season, that number stands at 21.

Corps Living Up to Standard at Linebacker U.

With four Butkus winners -- Brian Bosworth (1984 and 1985), Rocky Calmus (2001) and Teddy Lehman (2003) -- no school has won the honor more than OU. This year, Clint Ingram (SLB), Zach Latimer (MLB) and Rufus Alexander (WLB) are living up to the tradition. Ingram and Alexander were on the Watch List for this year's Butkus award:

Ingram, who missed the UCLA game with an injury, has three interceptions this season. Against TCU he returned a pick 23 yards and against Tulsa he went 48 yards for a touchdown.

- In his career, he has four interceptions, two fumbles caused, two fumbles recovered (vs. Texas last season, he caused and recovered a fumble on the same play) and six pass deflections in 18 starts. OU head coach Bob Stoops has called Clint Ingram "a ball magnet."
- His two sacks came vs. Kansas State and Texas.
- Latimer made his first career start against TCU. The junior responded with 15 tackles, including 11 that were solo. Latimer entered the game with 12 career tackles.
- He got 12 stops against Texas and is the team's second-leading tackler with 77.
- Alexander is the team's top tackler with 93.
- He had seven tackles for loss in his career heading into the Tulsa game, then logged four vs. TU. He also got four against Oklahoma State and added three against Kansas. His total for the season now stands at 17, which is tied for the team lead with Dusty Dvoracek.
- He has eight pass break-ups, one interception, two fumbles forced and one fumble recovery.

Dvoracek Brilliant in Return

DT Dusty Dvoracek is back after being dismissed from the 2004 squad and is a team captain. In 2003, he was credited with 40 tackles, including seven sacks and 16 TFL. All three of those numbers were tops on an OU interior line that included Tommie Harris, the Lombardi Award winner and a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears. This year, he has 39 tackles, four sacks and 17 tackles for loss.

- No. 1 nationally among DTs with 17 tackles for loss. His career total of 44 ranks No. 6 at OU ahead of the likes of Tony Casillas, Lee Roy Selmon and Dan Cody.
- Four tackles at UCLA, three for loss. He logged a 10-yard sack despite the fact that the Bruin lineman was flagged for holding him on the play. He had three more TFL and another sack against Kansas. Four TFL, one sack and his first career interception (on any level) at Nebraska.
- An All-District 6 Academic selection and a candidate for Academic All-America.

Sure Trivia Winner

Who is Oklahoma's leader in sacks? It's DE Calvin Thibodeaux with nine. The senior entered the season with a career total of two.

- OU is minus half of its anticipated two-deep at DE for the season. Larry Birdine was lost during the August drills with a torn left biceps. John Williams suffered a torn left ACL in the season opener vs. TCU.

- Thibodeaux made up half of book end defensive ends who played well. The other starter, C.J. Ah You, was the consensus Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year. He finished with five sacks. He also had one on a two-point conversion attempt against Baylor, although that one does not count on his total since it came on a PAT.

Freshman Rarity Happened Just Once Before

Two true freshmen started at the safety spots in two games this season -- SS Reggie Smith and FS Nic Harris. The only other time two true freshmen started in the Oklahoma secondary was the 1981 Sun Bowl. S Keith Stanberry got his only start of the year and CB Elbert Watts got his seventh.

Defending the Rush

Oklahoma ranks No. 5 in the nation in rushing defense, and if the Sooners can hold that spot, it will be their best finish under Bob Stoops (see table at left).

- This season may be the second in a row in which the Sooners limited their opponents to less than 100 yards per game for the season. The last time OU was under 100 for rushing defense in back-to-back seasons was 1985, 1986.

- Oklahoma held eight of its 11 opponents under 100 yards. Six had less than 65, four less than 30 and three less than 20.

- The opponents are averaging 2.8 yards per carry. The only Stoops-coached OU team that limited foes to a lower number was the 2002 team, which gave up just 2.3.

Total Defense Among Top 20 Again

Oklahoma ranks No. 16 in total defense this season. That has been somewhat standard for the Sooners under Bob Stoops ... No. 16 in 1999, No. 8 in 2000, No. 4 in 2001, No. 10 in 2002, No. 3 in 2003, No. 13 in 2004.

A look at special teams notes from Bob Stoops' era as OU's head coach:

- There have been 22 special teams TDs, including 15 in the last 47 regular season games. Those 15 came via five different kinds of plays -- nine punt returns, two faked field goals, a blocked punt, a kickoff return and a faked punt. The special teams also own one safety.
- OU has returned five kickoffs and 13 punts for touchdowns.
- The Sooners have blocked 18 kicks.
- Against TCU, Jason Carter tackled the punter. The Sooners then scored a FG.
- Against Kansas State, Jacob Gutierrez tipped a punt that traveled eight yards.
- Against Texas, OU faked a punt with J.D. Runnels rushing to gain a first down.
- Against Kansas, the Sooners faked an extra point with H Cody Freeby completing a pitch pass to Russell Dennison for a first down.
- At Nebraska, OU faked a field goal with H Cody Freeby pitching to K Garrett Hartley for a six-yard, first-down gain. A 17-yard TD rush followed on the next play.

Many Happy Returns

OU special teams under Bob Stoops:

- Kickoff Returns -- 37 returns of 25 yards or more with five touchdowns.
- Punt Returns -- 39 returns of 15 or more yards with 13 touchdowns.
- Interceptions -- 52 returns of 10 or more yards with 14 touchdowns.
- Fumbles -- Three returns of 15 or more yards with three touchdowns.

Sooners Get a Freeby

Sophomore Cody Freeby is in his first season at Oklahoma's punter. He ranks No. 15 nationally with an average of 43.1. OU is No. 11 in net punting at 37.8.

- The left-footer also is the holder for Garrett Hartley's placements.
- In his first game, Freeby averaged 38.3 yards on eight punts with three downed inside the 20 and no touchbacks. Only one was returned -- 10 yards.
- Tulsa: Averaged 50.0 yards on five kicks, his 70-yarder was the first by a Sooner since Jeff Ferguson got off a 71-yarder at Air Force in 2001.
- UCLA: Averaged 45.6 yards on five punts and allowed the then-nation's leading returner, Maurice Drew, just one attempt for five yards.
- Kansas State: Only two of his six boots were returned for a total of two yards.
- Texas: Scooped bad snap and kicked a 55-yarder. Added another 50-yarder.
- Baylor: 41.7 yards on six punts. One downed at the three, one at the one.
- Texas A&M: Averaged 54.8 yards on four punts for the third-best day in school history. None of the kicks was returned and one was downed at the A&M four.
- Texas Tech: Averaged 48.4 yards and uncorked a 73-yarder, the longest of his career. It matched the longest of the Stoops era.

Sooners Have Hart-ley

Garrett Hartley has been especially impressive with his kickoffs:

- Hartley has 55 full kickoffs (including squibs) with 25 touchbacks. He had five touchbacks vs. KSU, three more against Texas (on four kicks) and Texas A&M.
- His 52-yard FG vs. Texas was the longest by a Sooner against the Longhorns and a career-best for Hartley. He made 50-yarders against Nebraska and TCU.
- He made all three field goal attempts against Baylor, including a 39-yarder at the end of the first OT to force the decisive second extra period when OU got the win.

Rice Trumps all the Streaks

Jacob Rice, the long-snapper and a former standout TE/DE at Norman High, has been a starter in all 51 career games.

Notes on OU in Bowl Play and this Matchup

- Oklahoma is playing in its 39th bowl game. That total ranks No. 7 nationally.
- With 23 bowl victories, OU ranks No. 3 nationally. The Sooners' bowl record is 23-14-1 (.618).
- Oklahoma is playing in its seventh consecutive bowl game, which is only one off the school record of eight straight from 1975-82.
- This marks Oklahoma's first appearance in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl, the 12th different bowl game to host the Sooners. During the Bob Stoops era, OU also made its first trips to the Independence, Cotton and Rose Bowls.
- For just the second time in its history, Oklahoma is playing a bowl game in the state of California. The other such instance took place in the 2003 Rose Bowl when the Sooners downed Washington State, 34-14, in Pasadena, Calif.
- OU head coach Bob Stoops is coaching in the Holiday Bowl for the fourth time. He was in the game as an assistant coach at Iowa in 1986 and 1987 and with Kansas State in 1995. Stoops' teams won all three of those games. Iowa defeated San Diego State in 1986 (39-38) and Wyoming in 1987 (20-19). Kansas State prevailed over Colorado State in 1995 (54-21).
- Oklahoma assistant coach Brent Venables also has coached in the Holiday Bowl during Kansas State's appearance in 1995.
- Oklahoma is playing in California for the 15th time. The Sooners are 6-7-1 in California, including this season's 41-24 loss at UCLA on Sept. 17.
- There is one native Californian on the OU roster -- OL Chris Chester (Tustin).
- The Sooners have played only one previous game in San Diego. That came in 1996 when San Diego State turned back OU, 51-31.
- Oklahoma is 20-14-1 against teams currently holding membership in the Pacific 10 Conference. Only four of those games took place in bowl action -- the 1983 Fiesta Bowl vs. Arizona State, the 1985 Orange Bowl vs. Washington, the 2003 Rose Bowl vs. Washington State and the 2005 Orange Bowl vs. USC. The Sooners went 1-3 in those games with the lone victory coming in the Rose Bowl.
- Oklahoma recruiting coordinator and running backs coach Cale Gundy and Oregon secondary coach John Neal coached together at Alabama-Birmingham. Gundy was there from 1995-98 as quarterbacks and then running backs coach. Neal was there from 1995-2002 as secondary and recruiting coordinator and then defensive coordinator.
- There are no Oregonians on the Oklahoma roster nor are there any Oklahomans on Oregon's roster. In fact, the only Oregon native ever to play at OU was Ivan Preston, a wingback from Milwaukie, Oregon's Mount Union High School. He was on the Sooners' 1944 squad.

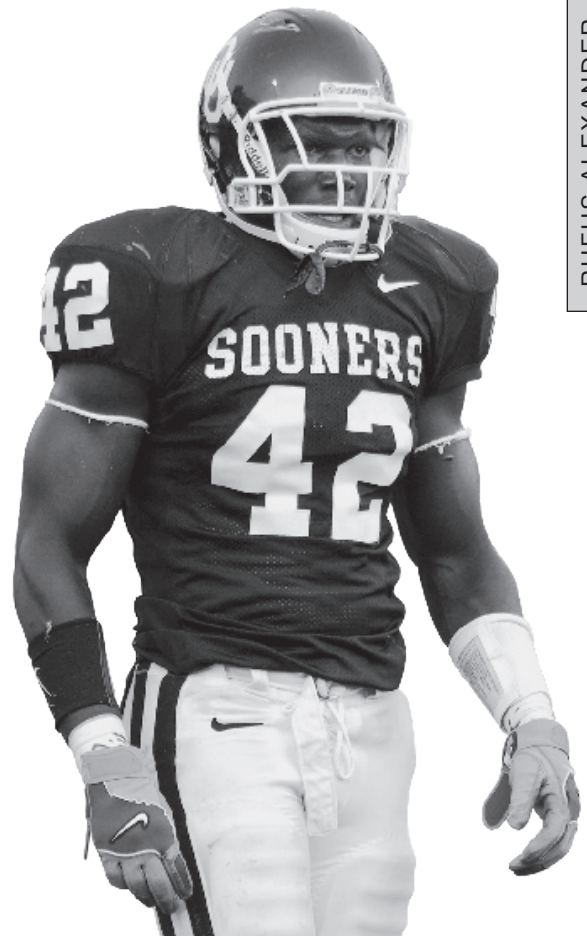
