NO. 5 'NOLES-NO. 1 SOONERS SET TO MEET IN PRIMETIME THE MATCHUP

- Florida State (No. 5 USA Today Coaches/No. 5 AP) entertains consensus No. 1 Oklahoma in a battle of unbeaten teams, Saturday at 8 p.m. on ABC.
- The Seminoles (2-0) are coming off a 62-10 victory at home over Charleston Southern, while the Sooners (1-0) had an open week on the schedule after beating Tulsa in the season-opener.
- The Oklahoma game marks the seventh time FSU has faced an AP No. 1 team, but just the second time that it plays host to the nation's top-ranked team at Doak Campbell Stadium. The Seminoles defeated No. 1 Florida 24-21, on Nov. 30, 1996.
- ESPN College GameDay makes its first visit to Florida State since Oct. 11, 2003 when the Seminoles entertained Miami.
- The Seminoles, however, are no strangers when ESPN College GameDay is in the house. This will mark FSU's 24th appearance, dating back to the inaugural GameDay "road show" when the 'Noles visited Notre Dame on Nov. 13, 1993.
- This is the seventh time that the ESPN College GameDay crew has visited Florida State. In addition to the 2003 Miami game, the crew has been on hand for: Miami ('95), Florida ('96), Florida ('00), Miami ('01) and Notre Dame ('02).
- FSU will try and improve to 3-0 for the first time since 2005, when the Seminoles won their first five games of the season.
- Florida State boasts an all-time Doak Campbell Stadium record of 257-84-4 and is 265-88-4 all-time in home games. This is FSU's 65th season of playing college football.

THE SERIES

- Oklahoma leads the all-time series against Florida State 5-1-0.
- This will be the first meeting between the schools in Tallahassee.
- Four of the previous meetings have come in bowl games, including three Orange Bowl matchups (1980, 1981, 2001). The inaugural meeting came in the 1965 Gator Bowl, where the Seminoles prevailed 36-19.
- The Sooners are 2-0 on their home turf, including last season's 47-17 victory.

THE COACHES

- **FLORIDA STATE:** Second-year coach Jimbo Fisher has an all-time record of 12-4 two games into his second season at the helm of the Seminoles. Fisher led FSU to a 10-4 record in 2010, establishing a school record for most victories by a first-year coach.
- **OKLAHOMA:** Bob Stoops is in his 13th season as head coach at Oklahoma and sports an impressive 130-31 record. He has led the Sooners to seven Big 12 titles and the 2000 National Championship, when his second OU team denied Florida State a successful title defense.

THIS IS FSU FOOTBALL

- Florida State boasts an all-time record of 467-231-17*, good for a .665 winning percentage which ranks 12th in FBS history.
- The Seminoles have won two national championships (1993, 1999).
- FSU has captured 12 Atlantic Coast Conference championships in 19 seasons of league membership, one shy of the conference record.
- Florida State has the nation's longest active streak with 29 consecutive bowl appearances, which ranks second all-time. The 'Noles have made 41 bowl appearances and their 24* victories rank fifth nationally.
- The Seminoles hold the nation's longest active streak of consecutive winning seasons at 34, which ranks as the seventh-longest all-time.

WHAT 2 WATCH 4

- Florida State is vying for its second win over a No. 1-ranked opponent and first since defeating top-ranked Florida, 24-21 at Doak Campbell Stadium in the 1996 regular season finale.
- The Seminoles have scored 96 points in their first two games – 34-0 vs. Louisiana-Monroe, 61-10 vs. Charleston Southern – which is the fourth most productive total after two games in school history. FSU scored 115 points through the first two games in 1995 and 2008, and 107 points after two games in 1949.
- Through two games FSU's defense has allowed: 10 points, 275 total yards (120 rushing/155 passing) and 15 first downs. Opponents have converted only 7-of-29 third-down attempts.
- Junior kicker Dustin Hopkins has scored 24 points in two games, pushing his career total to 240, which ranks eighth in FSU history. Greg Allen is seventh with 278 points.
- Hopkins booted two field goals against Charleston Southern, pushing his career total to 45, which ranks fifth in school history. Gary Cismesia is fourth with 65 field goals.
- Junior tailback Chris Thompson eclipsed the career 1,000-yard mark (1,019) with 21 rushing yards, including a TD, against Charleston Southern.
- Senior tailback Ty Jones has 899 career rushing yards and is closing in

on the 1,000-yard standard, where he would join teammates Jermaine Thomas (1,827) and Thompson.

- Senior wide receiver Bert Reed collected three receptions against Charleston Southern, pushing his career total to 148, which ties Greg Carr for fifth on FSU's all-time receptions list. Next up is E.G. Green (166).
- With a single-game, career-high, two touchdown receptions, Reed has equaled his season high for touchdown receptions with three in just two games. He had three in 2008.
- The Seminoles will try to improve to 3-0 to open a season for the first time since 2005. FSU is 8-1 at home under Jimbo Fisher.
- Florida State has not trailed at any point during the 2011 season and has not been behind on the scoreboard at any point in its last three games including its Chick-fil-A Bowl victory over South Carolina on Dec. 31, 2010.
- Florida State will have a sell-out crowd on hand for its matchup with Oklahoma. Student tickets sold out in 17 minutes on Sunday. FSU played in front of a sell-out crowd of 82,324 last season in the 31-7 win over Florida.
- The honorary captains for Saturday's game are former FSU All-American nose guard Ron Simmons and quarterback Brad Johnson.

HOME SWEET HOME

Florida State welcomes No. 1 Oklahoma into Doak Campbell Stadium for a Top 5 showdown. This is only the second time a No. 1 team has visited Tallahassee...

- FSU is 34-27-1 all-time at home versus ranked opponents.
- The Seminoles are 1-0 at home versus the No. 1 team in the nation beating No. 1 Florida 24-21 in 1996.
- The last time FSU won a home game versus a ranked opponent was September 5, 2005 versus No. 9 Miami (10-7).
- FSU's last win versus a top 5 team was a victory at No. 2 BC in 2007. The last home win versus a top 5 team came in 2000 with a win over No. 4 Florida.

ACC = BEST OF BOTH WORLDS

As Florida State celebrates its 20th anniversary of Atlantic Coast Conference membership, it should be noted that the Seminoles have benefitted from the affiliation beyond the playing field...

- The ACC is No. 1 among FBS conferences according to the 2011 annual rankings of American colleges and universities by US News & World Report.
- For the fifth consecutive year the ACC led all FBS conferences in the NCAA's APR rankings.
- The ACC also posted the nation's top GSR (Graduation Success Rate) among FBS conference for the sixth consecutive year.

ANOTHER FAST START

With the win over Charleston Southern, the Seminoles have opened the season with a 2-0 record for the first time since 2008 and just the fourth time dating to 2004...

- Fast starts were once the standard for the 'Noles, who from 1990-2003 opened a season with a 2-0 record 13 times in 14 attempts.

SEMINOLES PACE ACC IN 10-WIN CAMPAIGNS

The Atlantic Coast Conference played football for the first time in 1953, and while Florida State didn't climb aboard until 1992 it has more 10-win seasons than any other current member school...

- With its 10-4 record in 2010, FSU posted its 19th 10-win season in that 58-year span.
- Eleven of FSU's 19 10-win campaigns have

come as members of the ACC.

- The league's six remaining charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest – have combined for 19 10-win seasons in 58 years.
- Miami and Virginia Tech, which joined the ACC in 2004, have registered 14 and 13 10-win campaigns, respectively since 1953.

POLLING PROWESS RETURNS

Jimbo Fisher's Seminoles opened the 2011 season with their highest preseason rankings since 2004, checking in at No. 5 in the USA Today/Coaches poll and No. 6 in the Associated Press preseason Top 25.

- The last time the 'Noles opened a season with a Top 10 ranking they were No. 5 (AP)/No. 6 (USA Today) in 2004.
- From 1987-2002 the Seminoles were never ranked lower than No. 8 in the preseason rankings of either poll.

BLUEPRINT FOR SUCCESS

The Seminoles are facing a huge challenge in No. 1 Oklahoma and one of the nation's best defenses but there are some reasons for FSU to feel confident it can move the ball. Jimbo Fisher has coached in 15 games versus ranked opponents since coming to FSU in 2007 and...

- FSU has rushed for more than 200 yards in four of those games and has only been held below 100 yards rushing five times in those 15 games.
- Only four times has the Seminole offense been held below 300 yards in a game versus an AP Top 25 team since 2007.
- The key will be running the football. In FSU's seven wins over ranked opponents since Jimbo Fisher came to Tallahassee, FSU has rushed for more than 170 yards in each of the last four victories. In those four games, the Seminoles have thrown for less than 200 yards in each win.

Redshirt junior quarterback EJ Manuel eclipsed some career-bests for attempts (34), TD passes (two) and longest career TD pass (50) in week one versus ULM and the trend continued in week two versus Charleston Southern...

- Manuel tallied career-bests in completions (24), attempts (35), passing yards (329) and touchdowns (four).
- By halftime Manuel already had career-highs in touchdowns (three) and passing yards (299).
- Manuel completed passes to nine different receivers for the second straight game.

- His 53-yard pass to freshman receiver Christian Greene tied his career-best. He threw a 53-yard pass against Clemson in 2010, as well. It's his second pass of 50 yards or more this season.
- His previous career-best for completions was 23 against Virginia Tech in 2010.
- His previous career-best for attempts was 34 against ULM last week.

ON TARGET IN 2011

While EJ Manuel has made just eight career starts, the redshirt junior has shown he is as accurate as any QB to come through Tallahassee...

- After the first two games of the season, Manuel is now 180-268 passing for his career.
- With a career completion percentage of 67.1%, Manuel is on target to go down among the best ever at FSU.
- The career record at FSU for completion percentage (minimum 300 attempts) is held by Charlie Ward at 62.3%.

MANUEL GOES OVER 300

Three minutes into the second half versus CSU, junior quarterback EJ Manuel completed a nine-yard pass to Rodney Smith, giving him 308 yards - the first 300-yard-passing game of his career...

- He finished the game versus the Buccaneers with 329 yards passing.
- The last time FSU threw for 300 yards in a game came on Oct. 22, 2009 when Christian Ponder completed 33 of 40 passes for 395 yards in a 30-27 win in Chapel Hill, N.C.
- Manuel's previous career-best in yards was 288 yards against Virginia Tech in the 2010 ACC Championship Game.

DEBUT TIMES TWO

There is getting off to a good start and then there is what Clint Trickett and Rashad Greene did in the season opener when Trickett's first career pass went for a TD to Greene making his first career reception. The trend continued versus CSU...

- After hooking up for a touchdown on the very first play of both of their careers, redshirt freshman quarterback Trickett and freshman wideout Greene connected for two more scores versus Charleston Southern.
- Trickett found Greene for a 29-yard score with 36 seconds left in the third quarter and then again for a 69-yard score with 11:38 remaining in the fourth quarter.
- Greene's season statistics in his short career: three receptions, 126 yards (42.0 ypc) and three touchdowns.
- Trickett's season statistics in his short career: 7-of-8 for 176 yards and three touchdowns. He also had a four-yard rushing score against the Buccaneers.

TRACKING BERT

Senior wide out Bert Reed opened the 2011 season with four catches for 43 yards and a TD and after week two he continues his ascent up the FSU career charts...

- With 148 career receptions, Reed is now tied with Greg Carr for fifth-place on the all-time receptions list. He will need 18 more grabs to move into a tie for fourth place with E.G. Green.

- His 1683 receiving yards moved him past De'Cody Fagg and into 18th place all-time at FSU.
- He has now registered a catch of 25 yards or longer in four straight seasons.
- With his first ever two TD game against Charleston Southern, Reed has eight career touchdown receptions.

REED CAN RUN, TOO

Bert Reed has done a little bit of everything in his impressive FSU career and carrying the ball is on that long list...

- Reed had a 35-yard run at the 9:49 mark in the first quarter versus Charleston Southern.
- He has at least one 30-yard rush in all four seasons of his career.
- His career-long run of 42 yards came in both 2010 and 2009.
- For his career, he has 34 rushes for 243 yards, an impressive 7.15 average.

APPLYING FOR THE JOB

The loss of Taiwan Easterling to MLB meant FSU was missing 43 catches, 551 yards and five TDs from the 2010 squad. The question coming into 2011 was which of a talented group of receivers would fill that void...

- Rodney Smith had a big season as a sophomore in 2010 and was expected to play an even bigger role in 2011 and he has lived up to billing. The Miami native leads all receivers with 11 catches for 158 yards.
- While not compiling a ton of yardage, Jarred "Scooter" Haggins also showed he is ready to fill that void by hauling in seven balls for 49 yards.
- Haggins and Smith join with veteran Bert Reed as the top three receivers through the first two games with 25 of the team's 53 receptions.

PUTTING A DENT IN THE OPPONENT

Sophomore Greg Dent played a lot in 2010 but mainly on special teams. He registered just one catch as a freshman...

- Dent blew up his career numbers versus ULM with just one catch.
- The speedy receiver from Belle Glade hauled in a Sports Center highlight, 50-yard TD catch from EJ Manuel to give the Noles a 17-0 halftime lead.
- Last year the longest reception hauled in by a Seminole was Rodney Smith's 53-yard haul versus Clemson.
- Dent's first TD catch was the longest reception for a touchdown since 2009 when Christian Ponder hit Rod Owens for a 98-yard score versus North Carolina.
- With four catches in two games, Dent is second on the team with an average of 23 yards per catch.

SPREAD IT OUT

The Seminole passing attack amassed 280 yards through the air and three TD strikes in the opener versus ULM and the passing game was even more impressive in week two versus Charleston Southern...

- QB's EJ Manuel and Clink Trickett completed passes to 12 different receivers, the second consecutive week at least 10 'Noles caught passes.
- The last time 10 Seminoles caught a pass in

a game before this season was versus Wake Forest in 2010.

- Before that you have to go back to Florida in 2005 where 10 Seminoles recorded a grab.
- That same season 14 players made a catch in an October 22 win over Duke.

FOUR FOR 25

Not only did the Seminoles spread the ball around to their receivers in the season opener, they did so while eating up chunks of yardage...

- Four Seminoles (Rodney Smith, Bert Reed, Greg Dent and Rashad Greene) each caught a pass of at least 25 yards.
- The last time four different Seminoles caught a pass of 25 yards or longer in the same game was another season opener. This time in 2007 versus UAB. Preston Parker, Greg Carr, Richard Goodman and Damon McDaniel each hauled in a pass of 25+ yards all from Drew Weatherford.
- The big play capability continued in week two with three receptions of over 45 yards turned in by Rashad Greene (69), Christian Green (53) and Rodney Smith (45).

MORE THAN ONE ANSWER TO FSU'S GROUND GAME

Florida State returned four running backs who combined for nearly 700 career rushes coming into the 2011 season but there are some new threats emerging through the first two weeks...

- Seniors Jermaine Thomas and Ty Jones along with juniors Chris Thompson and Lonnie Pryor have combined for 4,013 career rushing yards and 46 career touchdowns entering the Oklahoma game.
- For their careers, the quartet averages almost six yards per carry (5.73).
- Each of these four players has at least eight career rushing touchdowns.
- Chris Thompson (1,019) has already joined Jermaine Thomas (1,804) with 1,000 career rushing yards.
- The last time FSU returned a group of running backs with more TDs on the ground than this current group was in 1996. That year Warrick Dunn (25), Rock Preston (12) and "Pooh Bear" Williams (15) combined to score 52 rushing TDs in their careers.
- All that being said, it was Thompson and true freshman Devonta Freeman who had the most success on the ground in the opener. The pair combined for 13 rushes for 58 yards and a TD.
- Then in week two it was another rookie, highly-touted freshman James Wilder, Jr., who led the team with 10 carries for 76 yards.

QUICK STRIKE ATTACK OR SLOW AND METHODOICAL?

In the season opener Florida State scored on three drives versus ULM which each consisted of double digit plays then one week later FSU scored on five drives of six plays or less...

- The Seminoles had field goal drives of 17 and 11 plays and then a TD drive of 14 versus ULM in the opener.
- The last time FSU had a longer drive than the 17-play field goal drive in the second quarter versus ULM, was in 2010 versus Wake Forest when the team put together an 18-play drive that ended in a fumble.
- The drive versus ULM was the longest one in

terms of plays to end up in points since a 17-play TD drive versus BYU in Utah in 2009.

- The last time FSU had three drives with 10 or more plays that all ended in points was in 2009 versus West Virginia in the Gator Bow when the squad had four. FSU cashed in during Coach Bobby Bowden's final game with a 10-play FG drive, a 13-play field goal drive, a 12-play touchdown drive and an 11-play FG drive.
- In week two, FSU had three TD drives of three plays or less.
- The last time FSU scored three touchdowns in a game all on drives of three plays or less was last season's 59-6 opening win over Samford.

WORK IN PROGRESS

Florida State's offensive line was a big point of discussion coming into the season with the loss of second-round pick Rodney Hudson and the graduation of center Ryan McMahon...

- The OL that took the field in the season-opener versus ULM had practiced together as a full unit for only about a week leading up to the opening game.
- Versus ULM, the Seminoles rushed for under 100 yards for just the third time in the last 16 games and for only the 14th time in the 52 games since Rick Trickett took over coaching duties for the guys up front.
- That number improved by leaps and bounds in game two as FSU piled up 170 yards on the ground versus Charleston Southern averaging 4.6 yards per rush.
- The pass protection will be a key this week versus OU as the Seminoles have allowed two sacks in consecutive games versus non-conference opponents for just the third time since Rick Trickett became the offensive line coach in 2007.

CAREER DAYS - CSU

The Seminole receiving corps had a big day versus the Buccaneers piling up 477 yards as 12 different players caught a pass. That led to some record days...

- Devonta Freeman set career-highs for receptions (three) and yards (30) in the first half.
- Kenny Shaw set career highs in receptions (five) and yards (67) in the first half.
- Christian Greene caught his first career pass in the second quarter, good for 53 yards.
- True freshman James Wilder, Jr. leads the team in rushes in a game (10), rushing yards in a game (76) and longest rush this year (41).
- Freshman Rashad Greene has the longest catch of the season (69 yards) and is tied for the team lead with TD catches in a game (2).

FIRST COME, FIRST SERVED: THE ULM EDITION

There were a ton of firsts for offensive players in the Seminoles' opening day win over ULM...

- True freshman running back Devonta Freeman entered the game for the first time in the third quarter. He caught his first career pass at the 8:02 mark in the third quarter and had his first rushing attempt on the next play, an 11-yard rush at 7:49.
- It was the first rushing touchdown by a true freshman since Chris Thompson scored twice against North Carolina State on Oct. 31, 2009.
- It was also the first rushing touchdown by a

true freshman in a debut/season-opener since Jermaine Thomas scored twice against Western Carolina on Sept. 6, 2008.

- True freshman tight end Nick O'Leary, the grandson of golfing legend Jack Nicklaus, hauled in a six-yard pass from EJ Manuel with 11:20 left in the fourth quarter. It was the first of his career.
- Sophomore wide receiver Greg Dent caught his first career touchdown pass on a 50-yard bomb from EJ Manuel at the 1:09 mark in the second quarter. Dent only caught one pass last year.

YOUNG GUNS

Jimbo Fisher has been pointing to this time in his FSU career when he would have the requisite depth and experience to return the Seminoles to the top 5 and he has, but it may be more youth than experience leading the way...

- Two of the team's top three running backs are freshmen in James Wilder, Jr. and Devonta Freeman.
- Six of the top eight receivers by receptions are sophomores or freshmen.
- The top three receivers by yards per catch are all in their first two years in college.
- Rashad Greene, a true freshman, is tied for the team lead with three TD catches.

OFFENSE UNDER JIMBO

Florida State scored 62 points versus Charleston Southern after posting 34 in week one versus ULM...

- The last time FSU scored 60 or more points came when it scored 69 versus Western Carolina in 2008.
- Florida State tallied 647 yards of total offense versus the Buccaneers. The last time FSU had 550 or more yards of total offense came against NC State in 2009 (555).
- FSU passed for 477 yards in the CSU game. The last time FSU threw for more than 400 yards came against Citadel in 2005 (485).
- The CSU win marked the 25th time in 55 games since Jimbo Fisher came to FSU that his offense has posted 30 or more points.
- If you remove his first season in Tallahassee, Fisher's offensive units have posted 30 or more points in 24 of 42 games (57%).

THAT'S A LOT OF YARDS

The Seminole offense piled up 647 total yards versus Charleston Southern. The Seminoles threw for 477 and rushed for 170...

- The last time FSU posted more yards than the team did versus CSU was back on November 4, 2000 when the Seminoles put up 771 yards versus Clemson behind Chris Weinke's 521 passing yards.
- The last time FSU eclipsed the 600-yard mark for total offense was in 2005 versus the Citadel when FSU posted 629 yards.
- The 677 yards put up versus CSU is short of the school record of 858 total yards against Maryland in 1992.

QUICKEST TOUCHDOWN IN YEARS

When EJ Manuel found Rodney Smith for a 45-yard touchdown on the third play of the game just one minute and 20 seconds into the contest (13:40 on the game clock), it was the quickest score by Florida State in years...

- It was the quickest score by Florida State since Tony Carter returned an interception 35 yards for a touchdown at the 13:46 mark in the first quarter of a 33-0 win over Virginia in Tallahassee on Nov. 4, 2006.
- It was the quickest offensive touchdown by the Seminoles since Leon Washington took a handoff and dashed 69 yards for a touchdown on the second play of the 2005 Gator Bowl just 22 seconds (14:38 game clock) into the contest. FSU went on to win 30-18 over West Virginia on Jan. 1, 2005.

OL AMONG MOST EXPERIENCED

Despite losing two of the most experienced starting offensive linemen in the country to graduation, Florida State opened the 2011 season with one of the most veteran units among FBS programs.

- The Seminoles' starting line of Zebrie Sanders (37), Andrew Datko (36), David Spurlock (28) and Bryan Stork (4) entered the season having combined for 105 career starts entering the Charleston Southern game.
- With the same starting offensive line in each of the first two games, FSU brings 115 career starts up front into the Oklahoma game.
- Only SMU (158), UAB (118), Tulsa (114) and BYU (106) had more combined starts among FBS programs entering the season.
- FSU lost 101 combined starts from graduates Ryan McMahon (school record 53) and Rodney Hudson (48).

SHUTOUT CITY

Florida State recorded its 17th season-opening shutout in the history of the program with the 34-0 win over ULM...

- The first shutout came on Oct. 9, 1948 – the Seminoles' second year of football – when FSU beat Cumberland 40-0. The last shutout before ULM in a season opener came on Sept. 6, 2008, when FSU defeated Western Carolina, 69-0.
- Florida State was one of just four teams to record a shutout during the opening weekend, joining Ohio State, UCF and Rutgers. Only Ohio State (42-0 vs. Akron) and FSU accomplished the feat against FBS schools, while UCF shutout FSU's next opponent, Charleston Southern, 62-0.
- Of the 12 ACC teams that played in the opening weekend, the Seminoles were the only squad to record a shutout.
- It's the second shutout of the Jimbo Fisher era and the sixth shutout since 2000.

HOLDING DOWN OFFENSES

A combination of a strong pass rush and a stout rush defense were two of many reasons why the Seminoles were able to hold Louisiana-Monroe to under 200 yards of total offense. The performance is an encouraging start to a unit that continues to progress, which was more evident in FSU's second game when it held Charleston Southern to only 84 total yards...

- The last time FSU held an opponent to under 100 yards in both passing and rushing in back-to-back games was in 1980. Florida State held Tulsa to just 90 yards rushing and 70 yards passing on Nov. 1, 1980. The next game, FSU held Virginia Tech to 83 yards rushing and 57 yards passing on Nov. 8, 1980.
- Prior to its victory over CSU, the Seminoles last held an opponent under 100 yards of total offense in 2005 versus The Citadel (91 yards).
- Florida State's ability to keep the opposing offense in check versus CSU surpassed the amount of times they held a non-conference opponent to under 200 yards in 2010. The Seminoles finished 4-1 against non-conference competition last season, but held just one of those opponents to under 200 yards of total offense (BYU – 191).
- - The Seminoles have already tied the amount of times they held any opponent under 200 total yards in 2010. Aside from its victory over BYU, FSU also held Wake Forest to under 200 yards (185) in a 31-0 win on Sept. 25, 2010.

GETTING TO THE QUARTERBACK

Florida State finished first nationally last season with 48 sacks, and is already off to a good start in 2011 after getting to Louisiana-Monroe quarterbacks Kolton Browning and Cody Wells on four occasions. In its second game, FSU brought down quarterback Malcolm Brown of Charleston Southern three times ...

- Linebacker Christian Jones and defensive linemen Cameron Erving and Bjoern Werner each recorded one sack against ULM to bolster the defensive play. Erving's sack was the first of his career in what was also his first game played as a Seminole after taking a medical redshirt last year.
- In game No. 2, defensive tackle Anthony McCloud picked up his third career sack, while Brandon Jenkins recorded his first sack of the season.
- Timmy Jernigan recorded his first career sack versus Charleston Southern.

GOOD DEBUT FOR VINCE WILLIAMS

Redshirt junior middle linebacker Vince Williams has worked hard to battle back from a back injury that forced him to redshirt the 2009 year and wait for his chance to shine after playing behind senior Kendall Smith in 2010. Williams made the most of his opportunity in game one before giving way to several other players who earned time on the field in game two ...

- The Davenport, Fla., native amassed a career-high seven tackles to lead the Seminole defense in FSU's 34-0 shutout over Louisiana-Monroe.
- Williams was responsible for one of FSU's best defensive stands when he shot through and stopped ULM quarterback Kolton Browning for a three-yard loss on a 4th-and-1 attempt. It was Williams' third tackle-for-loss of his career but his first since recording one against Wis-

consin in the 2008 Champs Sports Bowl.

- Williams tallied three tackles, including one TFL, in FSU's 62-10 win over Charleston Southern in game two.

GOOD LUC TO THE OPPOSITION

Sophomore weakside linebacker Jeff Luc earned most of his time on special teams as a freshman, but his opening-day performance in FSU's 34-10 win over Louisiana-Monroe suggests that he will be a key part to the Seminole defense this season. Luc did not earn as much time on the field in game two due to the outcome of the game.

- Luc, who was a heralded recruit tabbed as the nation's top inside linebacker out of high school, tied for second on the team with five tackles, including one TFL.
- Luc's five tackles versus ULM already ties his career-high that he set against Oklahoma last season. He now has 13 career tackles in his young career.
- The Port St. Lucie native registered one TFL in game two versus Charleston Southern.

WASTING NO TIME

Junior defensive end Brandon Jenkins produced a solid stat line in FSU's season-opening victory, and carried that over with a strong performance in game two ...

- Jenkins, who is a watch list member of six different national awards, produced five tackles, two TFL's for seven yards and a pass breakup
- The Tallahassee native was part of a strong defensive line that limited ULM to under 100 yards on the ground (99). The last time the Seminole defense accomplished such a feat prior to that game was Nov. 6, 2010, when it held North Carolina to 34 yards on 33 carries.
- Jenkins finished with three tackles, including a sack for an eight-yard loss, in game two versus Charleston Southern.

JERNIGAN SHOWS OFF DEFENSIVE LINE DEPTH

Freshman defensive tackle Timmy Jernigan was drawing rave reviews for his performance through preseason camp. In FSU's 62-10 win over Charleston Southern, the Lake City, Fla., native merited such praise ...

- Jernigan registered two TFL's for 11 yards, including a sack that dropped CSU back six yards.
- Led the Seminoles in tackles with four, a rare feat for a defensive tackle.
- Recorded one tackle in season-opening win over Louisiana-Monroe.

DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE

FSU held Charleston Southern to just three first downs (including none in the first half). The FSU record for lowest first downs by an opponent is two by the Citadel in 1962.

SEMINOLES RANK THIRD NATIONALLY IN TOTAL DEFENSE

Through two games and two dominant defensive performances, Florida State sits at third in the nation in total defense ...

- FSU has allowed an average of 137.5 yards per game, trailing only Kansas State (129/g) and UCF (130/g).
- The Seminoles have only surrendered one touchdown through the first two games.

- FSU is ranked fifth in pass defense (has allowed 155 yards through the air) and 16th in rush defense (has allowed 120 yards on the ground).

ACC'S BEST DEFENSE SO FAR

Statistically, Florida State has the best defense in the ACC two weeks into the 2011 season. The Seminoles stand atop the conference in four major defensive categories...

- Total defense (137.50 ypg)
- Scoring defense (5.0 ppg)
- Pass defense (77.50 ypg)
- Tackles For Loss (9.50 per game)

BACKING IT UP WITH HARRIS

Senior cornerback Mike Harris didn't start a game in 2010, but was the third cornerback alongside starters Greg Reid and Xavier Rhodes. In 2011, Harris has started both games at corner.

- Harris has helped lead a pass defense that ranks first in the ACC and fifth in the country, allowing just 77.5 yards per game through the air.
- Harris has five tackles and a half-tackle for a loss this season.

1ST HALF DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE

Florida State had a dominant first half of defense against Charleston Southern, allowing just eight yards of total offense (all on the ground) on 22 plays at the break.

- The Buccaneers were 0-for-6 passing in the first half.
- The last time an opponent completed one pass or less in the first half came on Nov. 5, 2005 when NC State was 1-for-7 at the intermission.
- The eight rushing yards were the lowest allowed in the first half by FSU since Duke rushed for five yards on eight attempts in 2007.
- Florida State held an opponent to no first downs in the first quarter for the first time since Sept. 29, 2007 in a 21-14 win over Alabama in Jacksonville, Fla.
- The last time an opponent had zero first downs in a quarter came when NC State had zero in the second quarter on Oct. 28, 2010.

SEMINOLES KNOW HOW TO GET OFF THE FIELD

Florida State forced the Buccaneer offense into eight three-and-out series after ULM had five against the Seminoles in the season-opener.

- FSU is forcing an average of 6.5 three-and-out series per game in 2011, ahead of the 2010 national leading average of 6.0 by TCU in 2010.
- Last season, FSU forced 3.5 three-and-out series per game, good for 18th in the country.

SCORELESS STREAK SNAPPED

When Charleston Southern scored on a half back pass from Teddy Allen to Carson Leshin with 10:33 remaining in the third quarter it snapped an opponent scoreless streak that dated back to the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl...

- FSU held opponents scoreless for a total span of 106:22. The last touchdown scored by opponent came when South Carolina scored with 11:46 to go in the fourth quarter on Dec. 31, 2010.
- The Buccaneer score also snapped FSU's defensive streak of not allowing a touchdown

at home that lasted 147:22, dating back to the first quarter against Florida on Nov. 27, 2010. The Gators scored at the 10:43 mark in the first quarter, the last home TD FSU allowed prior to tonight's game.

YEAR OF THE CORNERBACK

While former FSU greats Deion Sanders (Pro Football Hall of Fame induction in August) and Terrell Buckley (No. 27 jersey was retired in the season-opener) are capturing milestone honors to start the year, Greg Reid and Xavier Rhodes are also poised to gain national acclaim and make 2011 the "Year of the Cornerback" at FSU...

- Sanders (1988) and Buckley (1991) are the only Jim Thorpe award winners in Seminole history and the two greatest cornerbacks ever to wear the Garnet and Gold.
- Florida State is the only team in the country to have two cornerbacks on the 2011 Jim Thorpe Preseason Watch List, as Reid and Rhodes appear on the 37-member list. The Seminoles are one of only three teams that have more than a single player on the list given to the nation's top defensive back, joining Alabama (3) and Oklahoma (2).
- FSU is also the only team with two cornerbacks on the Bednarik Award Watch List. The Bednarik Award is given to the nation's most outstanding defensive player.

DYNAMIC DUO AT CORNER

Junior Greg Reid and sophomore Xavier Rhodes have the potential to be the top cornerback duo in the country in 2011...

- Reid and Rhodes combined for more passes defended (33) than any other cornerback tandem in the country. Reid tied for the ACC lead with 17, while Rhodes nabbed 16.
- Reid earned All-ACC honorable mention, while Rhodes snagged All-ACC Second Team honors along with the conference's Defensive Rookie of the Year Award.

BROTHERLY LOVE

Redshirt junior linebacker Vince Williams was joined this fall by his younger brother freshman cornerback Karlos Williams...

- The pair starred at Ridge Community High School in Davenport, Fla., but only played one year together four years ago in 2007 before playing for the first time together since then against ULM in the season opener. Vince said he sometimes gets surprised by seeing his once little brother lined up on defense with him. Karlos is 6-2 and 220 pounds and was a consensus five-star safety. "He's just a different person now," said Vince. "When I played with my little brother in high school, he was just a little freshman. It's amazing watching him back there. Sometimes it surprises me. I think 'Wow, that's my little brother. I used to have pillow fights with him.' He's a monster now."

BRADHAM EYEING ELITE COMPANY

Florida State senior linebacker Nigel Bradham has led the Seminoles in tackles for consecutive seasons, following his 93 in 2009 and 98 in 2010...

- Bradham is vying to become the first Seminole to lead the team for three consecutive seasons since Marvin Jones (1990-92). He registered four tackles in the season opening win

• Since 1976 only three Seminoles – Reggie Herring (1978-80), Paul McGowan (1985-87) and Jones – have paced the team in stops for three consecutive years.

BIG SINGLE NUMBER

Freshman defensive tackle Timmy Jernigan made his debut for the Seminoles against ULM wearing the same No. 8 he wore in high school.

- Jernigan isn't the only player over 250 pounds sporting a single-digit jersey number:

- He has made 12 consecutive field goals attempts of under 50 yards. His only missed field goal in the final four games of the 2010 season and the first two games of the 2011 season was a 51 yard attempt at Maryland on Nov. 20, 2010

- He was a perfect 53 of 53 in 2010. He has made each of his PAT attempts since the second quarter of the Seminoles' 54-28 victory at Brigham Young on Sept. 19, 2009.
- The school record for consecutive PAT's made is 108 by Derek Schmidt (1984-86).

- He has made all of his PAT attempts in 26 consecutive games.

- The Seminoles are one of only two teams in the ACC (also North Carolina) who has returned all four parts of the special teams unit – the holder, the snapper, the kicker and the punter.

THROUGH THE FIRST TWO GAMES

Dustin Hopkins has scored 24 points in the first two games of the season to rank 15th nationally in scoring among all players and tied for sixth among kickers entering Saturday's game against Oklahoma...

- His 24 points in consecutive games ranks as his best two game total in his career and marks the second time in his career that he has scored in double figures in consecutive games.

- Hopkins' 14 points against Charleston Southern came within one point of tying his single game career high of 15 points against West Virginia in the Gator Bowl on Jan. 1, 2009.

- He kicked a career high four field goals and three PAT's against the Mountaineers in the Seminoles' 33-31 win.

SPECIALISTS PROVIDE 'NOLES WITH FIELD POSITION EDGE

FSU kicker Dustin Hopkins and punter Shawn Powell, with the help of outstanding coverage unit work, repeatedly pinned ULM's offense deep in its own territory in the 34-0 Seminoles win...

- Hopkins kicked off seven times and ULM's average starting position was just beyond its own 16-yard line;
- Hopkins recorded two touchbacks, but three other kickoffs went to the end zone. ULM's best field position following a kickoff was its own 31, which was set up by an FSU penalty leading to a re-kick from the 25-yard line;
- Powell punted three times and pinned the Warhawks inside their own 20-yard line twice. ULM's starting position following each Powell punt was its own 10-, 20- and 15-yard lines;
- ULM failed to register any punt return yardage;
- Powell finished with a 41.7 average and a 35.0 net average; numbers that were potentially hindered because his punt attempts came from the FSU 48, ULM 39 and FSU 41.

The ESPN College GameDay crew is rolling into Tallahassee for Saturday's showdown between No. 1 Oklahoma and No. 5 Florida State. It will mark the 24th time the Seminoles have played a game with GameDay in attendance, but the first time they've set up shop at FSU since Oct. 11, 2003. This will be Florida State's seventh time serving as host in

the program's 25-year history. The Seminoles have a long history with GameDay, dating to the program's first "road show" appearance, which came Nov. 13, 1993 when No. 1 FSU visited No. 2 Notre Dame in the "Game of the Century" showdown in South Bend, Ind. Along the way, the 'Noles have won 10 GameDay contests; one of nine schools nationally to reach double-digits in victories. Here's a game-by-game breakdown of FSU's 23 previous appearances:

- Florida State has won just one game as the lower ranked team, knocking off Florida 24-21 in the 1996 2 vs. 1 showdown at Doak Campbell Stadium;
- In the 25-year history of the show, the higher ranked team has posted a 147-67 record
- The home team is 106-77 (not counting neutral site or championship game venues);
- The home underdog is a respectable 34-58;
- FSU's 10 wins with GameDay on site is tied for eighth all-time for total victories;
- Rival UF leads with 21, followed by Ohio State (19), Oklahoma (17), Southern Cal (15), Michigan (14), Miami (12), LSU (11), FSU and Alabama (10);
- This marks the 20th time an Atlantic Coast Conference school has played host to GameDay, which ranks fourth among major conferences;

THE "SUNSHINE SCOOTER" LIKES THE 'NOLES

Florida State alum Lee Corso is the only member of the GameDay crew who has been a part of the show since its inception. Nicknamed the "Sunshine Scooter" during his FSU Hall of Fame playing days as a football and baseball standout, Corso has been donning the headgear of his GameDay pick to win since Oct. 5, 1996.

- Since that date he's put on the headgear 195 times and predicted accurately 68.2 percent (133-62) of the time
- He has donned the Seminole headgear 12 times during that stretch, which is tied for the fourth-most selections of any school. Florida leads with 17, followed by Ohio State and Southern Cal (15), while FSU is tied with Alabama and Oklahoma (12).

ONE GAMEDAY APPEARANCE THAT WASN'T

Nearly 10 years ago to the day, No. 6 Florida State was supposed to entertain the ESPN College GameDay crew in Tallahassee, with the 'Noles slated to take on No. 10 Georgia Tech. The college football schedule for Sept. 15 was wiped clean in the wake of the 9/11 World Trade Centers tragedy. The Seminoles and Yellow Jackets rescheduled their game for the first Saturday in December, which was not picked up by GameDay.

OU WANTED TO KNOW

Oklahoma is certainly no stranger to GameDay appearances, having appeared in 25 games with the crew on site. The Sooners have a 17-8 all-time record with GameDay on the premises, including a 5-1 record at home. Their 17 victories rank third all-time behind Florida (21) and Ohio State (19). OU makes its 10th true road game appearance with GameDay in the house against Florida State. So how have the Sooners fared in true GameDay road appearances? Here's a game-by-game breakdown:

- Quarterback EJ Manuel spread the ball around, finding 10 different pass catchers while completing 22 of his 34 passes in 3 1/2 quarters of work. He finished the game with 252 yards passing, two touchdowns, one interception and 22 yards rushing.
- The Seminoles registered 372 total yards on the day (280 passing and 92 rushing). Rodney Smith helped that by hauling in a game-best six catches for 78 yards. Bert Reed and Greg Dent (50-yd TD catch) both caught touchdown passes and Jarred Haggins became a go-to target with five catches of his own.
- Defensively the Seminoles were nearly perfect, limiting ULM and its hurry-up, no-huddle offense to just 191 yards. The Warhawks didn't register over 100 yards in either running or passing (99 team rushing yards and 92 team receiving yards).
- Middle linebacker Vince Williams had a team-high and career-best seven tackles in the shut out. Brandon Jenkins, Jeff Luc and Lamarcus Joyner had five tackles apiece as well. Joyner added an interception.
- True freshman Rashad Greene added a 28-yard touchdown in the game, too, but it came from the arm of another quarterback. Not only was the catch his first reception as a Seminole, but it was on the first pass ever thrown by backup quarterback Clint Trickett.
- Dustin Hopkins made field goals of 24 and 23 yards respectively and re-turner Greg Reid gained 71 yards on four punt returns for a 17.8 average.

Rodney Smith also had a touchdown catch included in his five-grab, 77-yard outing and Lonnie Pryor had a scoring catch as well. Kenny Shaw added five catches for 67 yards and Christian Green had 63 yards on two catches.
- Rashad Greene caught two second-half touchdown catches of 29 and 69 yards from backup quarterback Clint Trickett. The duo has now connected three times for scores this season. Trickett finished with 148 yards on 6-of-7 passing and also ran one in for a score.
- Playing in his first game as a Seminole, running back James Wilder, Jr. had a team-high 10 carries for a game-best 76 yards.
- In total, the Seminoles generated 647 yards of offense, including 170 yards rushing and 477 yards passing. On the flip side, the Seminoles held Charleston Southern to just eight yards of offense and no first downs in the first half before allowing just 84 yards total and just three first downs for the game.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

- Named the 2010 Football Writer's Association of America's Freshman All-America Team Coach.
- Won the most games (10) by a first-year coach in Florida State history and tied for second most by a rookie coach in ACC history.
- Put together a 2011 recruiting class ranked either first or second nationally by ESPN.com, Scout.com and Rivals.com.
- Led FSU to its 29th consecutive bowl appearance - the longest active streak in the nation and second all-time to Nebraska's 35.
- Led FSU to first ACC Atlantic Division title since 2005 and first season sweep of Miami and Florida since 1999. In posting the first season sweep of in-state rivals Florida and Miami, joined former Florida coaches Ray Graves (1960) and Galen Hall (1985) to pull off the feat as a first-year coach. The 52-point combined margin of victory over the rival Hurricanes and Gators was the widest margin in a season sweep by the Seminoles.
- Guided FSU to its best home record (6-1) since posting 6-0 marks at Doak Campbell Stadium in 1999 and 2000.
- By winning six of his first seven games, joined former FSU coaches Don Veller ('48) and Larry Jones ('71) to notch that feat as a first-year coach with the 'Noles.
- Responsible for developing FSU QB Christian Ponder who, as a second-year starter, led the ACC in total offense and passing yards per game in 2009. Ponder capped off his senior season in 2010 by becoming the 12th overall pick of the Minnesota Vikings in the 2011 NFL Draft.
- As FSU's offensive coordinator from 2007-09, the Seminoles improved each season to rank



among the ACC leaders in total offense.

- Offensive coordinator for the 2003 National Champion LSU Tigers.
- Coached three players selected in the first round of the 2007 NFL draft including No. 1 overall pick JaMarcus Russell.

THROUGH 15 GAMES ...

- Became just the third coach in school history to record multiple shutouts in the first two years of his tenure at Florida State. The Seminoles earned shutouts against Wake Forest (Sept. 25, 2010) and ULM (Sept. 3, 2010) in the first 15 games of his career. Only Bill Peterson (1960 and 1961, four shutouts) and Don Veller (1948 and 1949, five shutouts) join Fisher as coaches with multiple shutouts in the first two years of their Florida State careers.
- With FSU's 34-0 victory over ULM in 2011 season opener, Fisher became the second winningest head coach after 15 games in FSU history with an 11-4 record. He is now only five wins from trying Don Veller (1948 and 49) as the Seminoles' winningest coach in the first two years of his head coaching career at Florida State.

- The Seminoles notched 10 victories for the first time since the 2003 season.
- FSU gained bowl eligibility for a 29th consecutive season - the longest active streak in the nation and second all-time to Nebraska's 35.
- Fisher's 10-win total was the most by a first-year coach in Florida State history and tied for second-most by a rookie coach in ACC history, trailing only Boston College's Jeff Jagodzinski (11) and Ralph Friedgen (10).
- The Seminoles closed the regular season with

a 31-7 win over Florida, snapping a six-game losing streak in the rivalry.

- FSU won five consecutive games early in 2010, equaling the program's longest winning streak since 2005.
- The 'Noles led the ACC Atlantic Division for nine consecutive weeks and secured the outright title when Maryland knocked off NC State 38-31.

HIDZ 1ST

- Jimbo Fisher and his wife, Candi, announced on Aug. 5 the creation of a new national fund to fuel the quest for a cure for Fanconi Anemia, a very rare life-threatening disorder that afflicts their 6-year-old son, Ethan, and many others.
- Money raised through a new campaign called "OnaKwest for a Cure" will support research into Fanconi Anemia at the University of Minnesota, one of the leading universities pioneering better ways to treat the disorder, in advance of finding a cure. The campaign will raise research dollars for the Kidz 1st Fund, just established by the Fishers, through the sale of t-shirts, wristbands and other products and through online donations. Coach Fisher said he will donate all fees associated with his public speaking engagements to the fund.
- This type of hereditary anemia, primarily a blood disease, can affect all systems in the body and leads to bone marrow failure. For decades, the disorder was thought to be untreatable, but promising advances in medical research have improved the prognosis. To extend their lives, most children suffering from Fanconi Anemia will require a stem cell transplant, either bone marrow or cord blood, yet many wait years to find a donor who is a perfect match - or never find one.
- The Fishers also are making a widespread appeal for people to join the National Marrow Donor Registry to determine if they are a match for any of the thousands of people whose lives depend on a bone marrow transplant. For more information visit: www.Kidz1stFund.com or www.OnaKwestForaCure.com.
